On Sunday 2nd July the five congregations of Cumbrae, Fairlie, St John's, St Columba's and Clark Memorial agreed the Basis of Union and voted for Rev Dr Graham McWilliams and myself to be the ministers in the new congregation.

The next step in the process will be for the Presbytery of the South West to agree to this when they meet in

September. This is highly likely as they asked us to do it in the first place! We anticipate that the union of the five congregations will take place at the beginning of October.

From the first Sunday in October the service in Largs will be held at 11am, in Fairlie at 9.30am and in Millport at 11am.

The process of union will take some time to complete as there are many moving parts. There will be contracts for the employees of the new congregation. We hope that Mr Gus McKay will continue to work part time to help with various aspects of ministry in the new parish. The process of bringing the congregations together will require patience and understanding from everyone.

Making others welcome is a Christian duty. This struck me forcibly the first time I went to Malawi. I stayed with a minister and his family, who slept on the hard floor of their living room so that I could have a bed for the night. Not only that, but they got up at four a.m. to light a fire so that I could have warm water for a wash when I woke up in the morning. I was deeply touched by their thoughtfulness and kindness.

When the churches come together a similar mindset will be required. A willingness to adapt and to accept change. I'm at an age myself where adapting to change is becoming more challenging! We all prefer to stay in our comfort zone. Being forced to do a new thing could be the best thing that has happened to us. Accepting new ideas, interacting with different people is what has energised the church in the past and it is what will energise it in the future. It requires patience and generosity from all of us.

### ST. JOHN'S CHURCH - 1843 to 2023

The origins of the congregation of St John's, Largs lie in the formation of the free Church of Scotland following the disruption of 1843. Immediately after this historic event Rev John Dow of the Parish Church in Largs, along with two hundred members of his congregation, established the Free Church in Largs.

Ever since then St. John's has stood proudly on the seafront as a symbol of Christ's care and well-being for us.

Now, a 180 years on, the church is to close and a new congregation taking in Cumbrae, Fairlie and Largs is to be formed with three places of worship: Cumbrae, Fairlie and Largs with the use of Clark Memorial buildings and has been re-named Largs Community Church.

As we all know the church is not a building but a "church is the people" and with that in mind we wish to thank all of those who have helped look after the congregation for those 180 years.

Since the retiral of the Rev. Andrew McGurk in 2011 St. John's has gone through turbulent times with two short ministries of Rev. Markus Thane and Rev. Jonathan Fleming and during the times of vacancy we have had a number of Interim Moderators and Locum Preachers and of course Covid-19 intervened.

During the past few years the members of St. John's have been very supportive in running the church and making sure that services and pastoral care of the members carried on as normal.

The Dunn Memorial Hall, Small Hall and TocH Hall will remain open for the time being and be available for use by church organisations and the wider Largs community.

As the time draws near for the final regular Sunday service to take place we give thanks to all who have maintained the ongoing Christian work in our parish, town and with our missionary partners. We look forward to a fresh beginning with the newly formed Parish of Cumbrae, Fairlie and Largs, working together to bring the Word of God to our parish.

#### THE REPAIR SHOP

In a popular TV programme people bring treasured but damaged items for repair. The Japanese have an ancient way of repairing broken pottery, called Kintsugi. When the broken pieces are aligned properly with each other, the breaks are then fixed with lacquers of powdered gold. The result is beautiful, maybe even better than before the pottery was broken.

As individuals and as churches we have our brokenness. Fiona Barnard, in "Day by day with God", says we can have "sharp edges and uncertain potential and use." We are supposed to be a holy people, set apart for God. God knows where our sharp edges are, where we are broken and in need of repair. Yet he can transform each and every one of us. God can transform the church we are about to be together. We can be beautiful for God if we let him repair us by his Holy Spirit. Wounds can be healed, differences softened, fears let go. He has a purpose for each one of us, a way we can serve Him.

Do we bring our sin, our brokenness to God and let him make repairs? Do we mean it when we confess our sin? He can make us who we are meant to be, not just for ourselves, but for the community, for the world. One broken area in our church is a matter for concern. Unruly tongues, critical words. James, Jesus' brother, warns against this (James 3.5-12). He describes the tongue as fire, speaking of a small spark setting alight a whole forest. This summer we have seen the devastation fire can bring when it is not controlled and used for a positive purpose. What of us? Can we so speak as to draw people into the church, not drive them away? Can we play a positive part in the new parish? Can we let the Holy Spirit be free to move us?

We don't yet know what God has in mind for the new parish, or what he will ask of us. Yes, we are anxious about the unknown. As the theologian Martin Buber said, "All journeys have secret destinations of which the traveller is unaware." In the Bible and in churches we have seen God do mighty things. Are we on the lookout for what he will do through us? Will we let him? The Moderator wrote of meeting the youth delegates to the General Assembly. She picked out three positive words which rang out from what they said, "hope, optimism, community". Will those be keynotes of what we say and do in our life together as we move forward as one church?

#### BETHESDA HOME CHURCH, LAGOS, NIGERIA

Isaiah 29 v 18 'And in that day shall the deaf hear the words of the book, and the eyes of the blind shall see out of obscurity, and out of darkness'.

In Lagos, Nigeria's largest city, there is a place of worship called Bethesda Home Church. It was established three years ago by Mr Chioma Ohakwe and is where people who were once socially-excluded because of blindness are welcome, and the church is thriving. In Nigeria a cultural and traditional stigma of being physically handicapped still

lingers, even if it's only at the back of people's minds; however musical talent at Bethesda Home Church is nurtured and celebrated. On Sundays the congregation sings and dances to the music of hymns, with a special backing of keyboard, drums, guitars, and a choir. All musicians and many of the congregation are visually impaired. This is remarkable.

In that African country roughly twenty-five million people live with physical disabilities including blindness, and before 2018 they were marginalised and considered to be 'cursed'. In 2018 a Nigerian law overturned these age-old misconceptions, and severe penalties are now imposed for contravention of what is a breakthrough legislation.

Mr Ohakwe's Bethesda Home Church demonstrates that when people start seeing Ability instead of disabilities, it produces a positive experience. One choir member, and he is no shrinking violet, has a message for handicapped people everywhere (and we are all handicapped in some way). Mr Nathaniel Ndukwe, with his bleached blond hair and diamanté shoes, is blind but he sparkles in the choir's front row. He says, 'I want everybody out there to have in his mind that there is a lot you can do - if you believe in yourself!'
